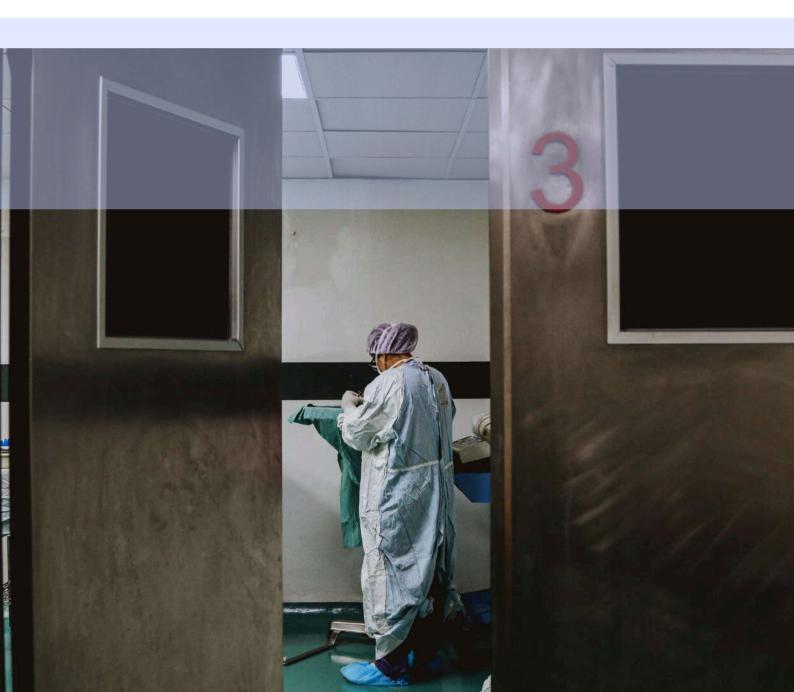

# About this report

Climate Action Accelerator is a non-profit association created on 23 December 2020, which began operations in the first quarter of 2021.

This financial report includes income, expenses and results for the period going from 1 January to 31 December 2024, as certified by the auditors appointed by decision of the Extraordinary General Assembly on 3 February 2023.



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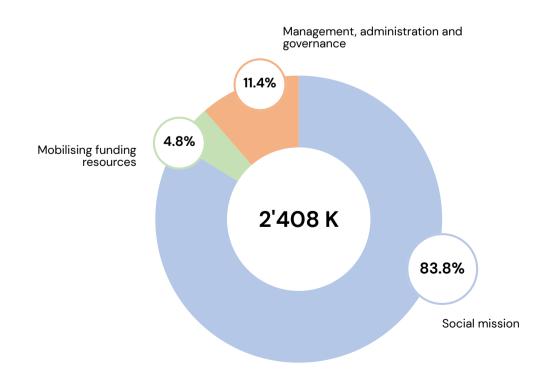
# Summary

With expenses amounting to CHF 2,409 million, covered by an income of CHF 2,424 million, the Climate Action Accelerator's accounts for 2024 show a **12.7% growth** compared with 2023, as well as a **positive result** of CHF 15,311 after taking into account changes in allocated funds.

## **Expenses**

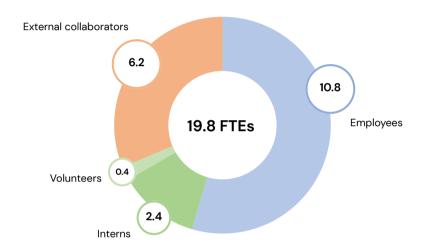
Expenses in 2024 amounted to CHF 2,408,534 (CHF 2,134,462 in 2023), of which:

- CHF 2,019,541, or 83.8% of expenses, was dedicated to achieving the social goals of
  the Climate Action Accelerator: rallying and empowering 34 partner organisations in the
  initiative, developing pilot pathways and technical solutions to reduce their carbon
  footprint, launching an open community for sharing, and accelerating large-scale action
  in the international aid and health sectors as a priority.
- CHF 114,898, or **4.8%** of expenses, was allocated to **mobilising funding resources**, which are essential to achieving the association's ambitions and ensuring its long-term viability through a financial diversification strategy.
- CHF 274,094, or **11.4%** of expenses, were used to ensure the functioning of the organisation, in particular **management**, **administration** and **governance functions**.



#### **Human resources**

- The total number of full-time equivalents (FTEs) averaged 19.8 for the year 2024, including 10.8 FTE employees, 2.4 FTE interns and 0.4 FTE volunteers, plus 6.2 FTE regular external collaborators with service contracts.
- Volunteering and workers in transition under public unemployment schemes made an essential contribution to the implementation of the initiative, represented a valuable contribution in 2024. Eight of them joined the team throughout the year.
- As 31 December 2024, the number of collaborators reached 31 employees across all statutory positions.

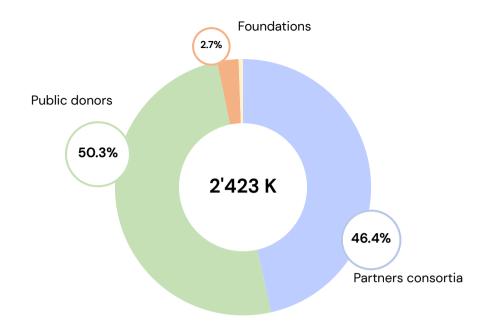


## Income

Income amounted to CHF 2,423,858, an increase of 12.7% compared to the previous year (CHF 2,150,455 in 2023):

- CHF 1,219,681 (CHF 1,082,906 in 2023), or 50,3% of resources, from public institutional funds.
- CHF 1,125,871 or 46,4%, from our partners. Among these, 38,1% are of an unearmarked nature and correspond to programme contributions from 21 NGO partners under partnership agreements signed for a usual term of three years around shared objectives and pilot projects related to the climate crisis. Another 8,3% come from grants within the framework of consortialed by our NGO partners.
- CHF 65,000, or 2,7%, come from private donors, principally an earmarked contribution from the Ferster Foundation.

In total, **49,7%** (50% in 2023) of our income came from **private sources in 2024**, of which 78% was unearmarked and free to be allocated by the Climate Action Accelerator to the implementation of its strategic goals and action.



In 2024 we also started accepting **individual donations** for the first time, representing CHF 8,062 in total. As a non-for-profit association registered in Switzerland, we were granted a **tax exemption status** by the Canton of Geneva.

## Result

The association's accounts show a **positive result of CHF 15,311** at the end of 2024, representing 0.6% of annual expenses. **This brings the association's reserves to CHF 88,413** as at 31 December 2024, representing 0.5 months of activity.

# Expenses

## Allocation of expenses

Our expenses of CHF 2,408,534, representing a **growth of 12.7%** compared to 2023, can be broken down as follows:

- 83,8% to support the achievement of our social mission or goals,
- 11,4% for the running or operating expenses of the initiative,
- 4,8% for resource mobilisation.

#### Social mission

At CHF 2,019,000, expenses allocated to the social mission or goals represent **83.8% of the total** in 2024 and concern three main areas of activity:

- Sectoral acceleration (65.3%), which includes mobilisation activities, pilot programmes with partners to transform practices in our target sectors (mainly international aid and health), amplification at sectoral level, and capability-building with the development and dissemination of generic guidelines such as an operational playbook for humanitarian organisations.
- Research, development and capitalisation (9.6%), including technical analysis and documentation of decarbonisation solutions, capitalisation and evaluation of experience, and finally the development of policies and technical or cross-cutting tools.
- Knowledge sharing (8.9%), including events, the open-source platform and knowledge transfer activities.



Sectoral acceleration remains the largest expense item in the social mission, accounting for CHF 1,573,000 (65.3%), mainly allocated to support pilot roadmap programmes with partners but also technical and amplification projects.

These latter activities may be broken down into the following specific activities:

- Mobilisation of organisations around strategic commitments and objectives (-50% emissions by 2030)
- Workshops to share and develop solutions
- Methodological framework and guidance to enhance credibility and comparability of carbon emissions measurement
- Co-construction of climate and environmental roadmaps
- Transfer of expertise and tools to accelerate priority implementation projects
- Facilitation of technical working groups and development of generic tools
- Development of projects of collective interest such as a roadmap for the international humanitarian assistance sector, analysis of donor policies, etc.

Sectoral acceleration activities specifically mainly dedicated to the aid sector were complemented by others focusing on the area of international health, such as the demonstration project 'Climate-Resilient, Sustainable and Low-Carbon Hospital' (CRESH) in N'gouri, Chad, with ALIMA and Alerte Santé or the launch of a pilot primary healthcare project with Stellenbosch University and Western Cape province in South Africa.

The climate and environment roadmaps of ICRC, MSF Logistique and MSF Supply, five West African NGOs and World Scouts Movement were finalised in 2024, while those initiated with the Société Nationale des Sauveteurs en Mer, PATH and Unitaid were to continue in 2025 and a collective cycle with seven more African partners kick-offed in November 2024.

Programme expenses, all sectors combined, include a portion of digital and hosting expenses, as well as expenses corresponding to the rent for the Geneva office. These are allocated proportionately to the costs of staff dedicated to programmes.

Other expenses related to the social mission are as follows:

- Research, development and capitalisation (CHF 232K): production of analyses, capitalisation of a playbook for national actors based on our experience with the first African NGOs, webinars and thematic workshops, development of policies and technical tools, cost modelling and our trajectory modelling tool.
- Knowledge sharing (CHF 214K): organising regional (Dakar) and global (Geneva) events, maintaining and developing new features for the open-access web platform, publishing new content and managing our social media accounts.

With more than 6,000 followers on LinkedIn, the initiative occupied a growing space, particularly among aid actors, by the end of 2024.

#### **Fundraising**

A total of CHF 114,897, or 4.8% of the Climate Action Accelerator budget, was spent in 2024 on actively seeking and managing public and private funding.

This investment was reinforced in 2024 with the establishment of an internal taskforce to develop a business case for private foundations to support our 2024–2028 development strategy. It reflects our ambition to attract the necessary resources to scale-up the initiative and pursue a financial strategy aiming to balance contributions from partners, public institutional funds, which already cover half of our income, and finally funding from foundations and private donors.

The year 2024 was also devoted to managing more than 16 institutional and foundation funding contracts, including financial and narrative reporting.

#### **Operating or running costs**

Executive management, administration and governance were provided throughout 2024 by a coordination team of six members, led by Bruno Jochum, Director General, accompanied by two other senior Directors, Pierre Beurrier (Resources) and Béatrice Godefroy (Policy Engagement). All the main internal 'units' were represented within the coordination team.

Additional voluntary support for administration from the SINY unemployment programme (+0.5 FTE) strengthened the Resources team without leading to extra expenses.

In 2024, a total of CHF 274,094 was spent on operating expenses, of which CHF 105,199 was for financial management and CHF 91,735 for human resources and administration.

Operating expenses include among others:

- The portion of the salaries of the two directors devoted to operating the initiative.
- Logistical expenses related to the organisation of team seminars.
- Digital expenses, including software licences, IT equipment and migration to the Sharepoint platform.
- Accountancy, fiduciary and legal expertise.
- Governance expenses, including those related to the organisation of Committee and General Assembly meetings.

Office rent and digital expenses are broken down into each expense line proportionately to the direct staff set-up they are related to.

## **Human resources**

Human resources (HR) constitute the largest category of expenses. These personnel costs are devoted to fulfilling the initiative's social mission, mobilising resources and running the association. They represent CHF 1,987,133 (CHF 1,407,497 for employees and CHF 579,357 for external collaborators), or 82% of expenses. Including office rent and related IT expenses, HR related expenses account for nearly 89% of Climate Action Accelerator's budget, which is consistent with the type of activities carried out (mobilisation, capacity building, expertise, policy engagement, etc.).

During 2024, the Accelerator not only strengthened its team by recruiting additional employees and multidisciplinary external collaborators to support the growth of programme and support activities, but also by hiring interns and regularly welcoming volunteers (mainly dedicated to the Solutions, Resources and Communication Hubs). On average over the year, 19.8 FTEs were mobilised, including 10.8 FTE employees, 2.4 FTE interns and 0.4 FTE volunteers, plus 6.2 FTE regular external collaborators with service contracts. As at 31 December 2024, the team, including regular external staff, consisted of 20.4 FTEs representing a total of 31 collaborators.

Since 2022, the association's offices have been located in a co-working space, allowing team members based in Geneva to benefit from a flexible working environment equipped with eight fixed workstations, shared stations and virtual meeting spaces. Since November 2023, an additional room has been made available if necessary. The free spaces within the building are regularly used by guests, volunteers and interns.

A videoconferencing system allows for better interaction with other team members based in France, the United Kingdom, Germany, Australia and, since spring 2024, Senegal.

In terms of remuneration, following a benchmark survey of NGOs and the Geneva public sector in the initiative's three target sectors (Aid, Health and Higher Education), the salary scale for the organisation's employees in Switzerland was approved by the Board of Directors in March 2021.

Two principles in particular were validated on this occasion:

- The first limits the elasticity between the highest and lowest salaries to a maximum of approximately four times.
- The second introduced a temporary reduction in salaries (from 0% for the lowest salaries to -17% for the highest) during the launch phase of the initiative. The Committee meeting on 8 December 2022 lifted the existing reduction completely for the lowest salaries and partially for other salaries as of 1 January 2023.

As shown in the table below, the three highest salaries within the association are:

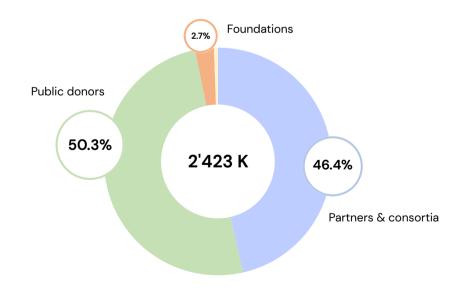

### Allocation of income

In 2024, the Accelerator had a total income of CHF 2,423,845, comprising CHF 2,325,406 received during the year, plus CHF 98,691 from variations in allocated funds, with an early reception in 2023 of several funds for 2024. This represented a **growth of 12.7%** (CHF 2,150,455 in 2023). The main sources were:

- CHF 1,219,681 (CHF 1,082,906 in 2023), or 50,3% of resources, from public institutional funds, after variations in funds allocated.
- CHF 1,125,871 or 46,4%, from our partners, after variations in funds allocated. Among these, 38,1% are of an un-earmarked nature and correspond to programme contributions<sup>1</sup> from 21 NGO partners under partnership agreements signed for a usual term of three years around shared objectives and pilot projects related to the climate crisis. Another 8.3% come from grants within the framework of consortia led by our NGO partners.
- CHF 65,000, or 2,7%, come from private donors, principally an earmarked contribution from the Ferster Foundation.

With now 49,7% of public institutional funds reached over the year, the first step of our diversification in revenue has been largely achieved beyond the initial contributions of our NGO partners. This strategy now needs to be expanded to private foundations also.



Programme contributions are sums paid by the initiative's partners under a three-year partnership agreement to support the achievement of common objectives and a pilot programme to which both parties contribute through their actions. These partnership agreements are always concluded between non-profit entities, NGOs or public institutions and the Climate Action Accelerator.

#### Private income from non-profit organisations through partnership agreements

- Private income consists mainly of programme contributions from partner organisations, which are unearmarked. They are subject to reports on the use of funds after each year. They are negotiated according to the budgetary capacity of the organisations, with the largest amount in 2024 reaching CHF 140,000 for the ICRC and the smallest representing CHF 8,000 for Terre des Hommes Switzerland.
- These contributions support the achievement of the Climate Action Accelerator's
  ambitions, both in terms of direct collaboration to achieve the operational objectives
  defined jointly within the framework of a pilot programme, and in terms of financing
  projects of collective interest for the wider community at the sectoral level (e.g.
  inventory of solutions, open source digital sharing platform) or providing free support
  to small NGOs in developing countries.
- In addition to these unearmarked programme contributions, there are also additional private contributions representing CHF 202,108 through consortia hosted by operational partners such as Alima and the S Foundation or Terre des hommes and Novonordisk (see financial statement) in support of specific project collaborations.

By the end of 2024, a critical mass of 34 organisations were participating to the initiative. Several other organisations were being approached (International Rescue Committee, IFRC, Solthis, La Chaine de l'Espoir, etc.) to join the initiative in full in 2025.

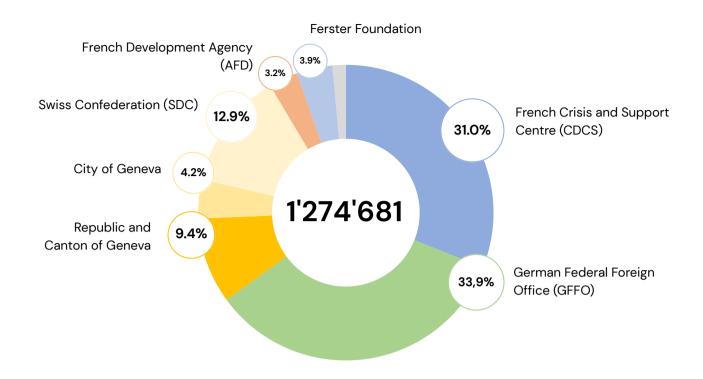
#### Income from public and private institutions

With regard to public institutional funds, in 2024, several major institutional donors renewed their trust in the Accelerator: the Swiss Confederation (SDC), the Canton of Geneva and the City of Geneva, the French Crisis and Support Centre for Foreign Affairs (CDCS) and the French Development Agency (AFD) and the German Federal Foreign Office (GFFO).

Their contributions have enabled a number of essential activities for the aid sector to be carried out:

- SDC supported the development of tools to facilitate the measurement of carbon emissions by humanitarian organisations, as well as the engagement of donors and the United Nations as key systemic actors in accelerating the decarbonisation of the sector.
- The Canton of Geneva allocated CHF 120,000 to support the implementation of climate and environmental roadmaps for international aid organisations and actors based in Switzerland and Africa.
- The City of Geneva's international solidarity programme contributed to the establishment of a sustainable, low-carbon and resilient development model for national and local organisations in Africa.
- The German Federal Foreign Office (GFFO) has contributed to our regional initiatives in Africa, as well as to the development of the sectoral roadmap for the humanitarian sector.
- CDCS contributed to the sectoral roadmap for decarbonising the humanitarian sector, the implementation of climate and environmental roadmaps for international aid organisations, the engagement of donors and the United Nations, and the design of a capacity-building programme for humanitarian organisations.
- ECHO, through two consortium projects led by ALIMA, supported the Climate Action Accelerator's research on alternatives to plastic packaging used in medical and nutritional activities. They also helped accelerate the implementation of ALIMA's roadmap and the development of the sectoral roadmap for the humanitarian sector.
- AFD contributed CHF 44,000 in 2024 to launch a research and collaboration project to support the climate transformation of hospitals and health systems.

Besides, we received grants from two private institutions, the Ferster Foundation and EPFL.

# **Conclusions and prospects**

Delivering impact requires a long-term approach and sustainable economic model for the Accelerator, capable of supporting the necessary transformation to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, other environmental impacts and strengthen resilience in the sectors we have chosen to prioritise. This means continuing our efforts to balance and diversify our sources of funding – whether from our partners, institutional funding or support from private foundations – to ensure that our ambitions are achieved, context-related risks are reduced and the initiative is sustainable on the long term.

In 2024, institutional funding, particularly from the SDC, the GFFO and the CDCS, played a central role in consolidating the initiative, delivering results for the aid sector and strengthening our technical expertise.

While our first operational partnerships were in majority renewed for a further three years, our community has grown with the arrival of new non-governmental organisations, further amplifying our collective momentum.

Building strong, lasting and high-quality relationships with our public institutional donors, remains a priority. This involves involving them not only in project financing, but also in strategic transformation dynamics, particularly following the recommandations of the generic roadmap for the aid sector published in June 2024.

Mobilising private foundations was a priority in 2024, and will be even more next year, with a few first successes. The Alima Foundation, the Ferster Foundation and the S Foundation actively contributed to the year's income., either directly or through consortia. The ability to attract the support of several more foundations will be prove to be critical in 2025 to scale-up the initiative and its impact.

The trust of our current partners and donors must be consolidated in 2025 by demonstrating the added value of our initiative, upgrading our internal quality management policies, our risk management system and our accountability in an uncertain international context that is significantly affecting budgets.
